Health Canada's Official Language Community Development Bureau

The Official Language Community Development Bureau is responsible for the implementation of Section 41 of the Official Languages Act at Health Canada.

- Enhancing the vitality of official language minority communities (OLMCs) and supporting and assisting their development.
- Fostering the full recognition and use of both English and French in Canadian society.
- Ensuring that positive measures are taken by Health Canada in implementing these commitments.

Mandate

- Improve access to health services for OLMCs in Canada;
- Promote the use of both official languages at Health Canada; and
- Ensure that Health Canada takes positive steps for implementing section 41 of the Official Languages Act while respecting the jurisdiction and powers of the provinces and territories.

Roles

- Managing the Official Languages Health Program (OLHP), which is part of the Action Plan for Official Languages – 2016-2023, Investing in Our Future;
- Promoting and developing partnerships with OLMCs, as well as provinces and territories;
- Providing advice and guidance to Health Canada branches and regional offices to assist them in the implementation of Part VII of the Official Languages Act;
- Developing and updating bi-annual departmental action plans and report annually to Canadian Heritage on the implementation of section 41 of the Official Languages Act;
- Engaging OLMCs and various partners to meet the health needs of their members;
- Supporting activities related to the Federal Health Portfolio Consultative Committee for OLMCs in Canada; and
- Supporting health research on OLMC priorities to inform policy development related to access to health services.

Health Canada's Official Languages Health Program

The Official Languages Health Program (OLHP), launched in 2003, aims to improve access to health services for official language minority communities (OLMCs).

The OLHP received a total of \$191.2 million over five years (including \$5.3 million in operating and maintenance costs) under the government-wide Action Plan for Official Languages – 2016-2023, Investing in Our Future.

The program includes the following three mutually reinforcing components:

1 – Training and Retention of Health Professionals (\$117.6 million over five years)

Health Canada provides support to postsecondary training institutions in order to improve the availability of bilingual health service providers across the country and specifically in regions where the needs of OLMCs are greatest.

- The Consortium national de formation en santé (CNFS), which includes a national secretariat and 18 postsecondary member institutions outside Quebec, offers over 100 French-language health programs in eight provinces and works with health facilities to offer internships and placements for its students.
- McGill University offers language training to existing health providers, as well as bursaries and internships for integrative health professionals in regions where there is significant need for English-terminale services.

2 – Health Networking (\$46.2 million over five years)

Health networks work with various partners (communities, decision-makers, health managers, health professionals, and postsecondary institutions) to develop innovative solutions to improve access to health services for OLMCs. Targeted investments in this component are:

- The **Société Santé en Réseau (SSR)**, with its 18 networks across all provinces and territories (except Quebec) for French-speaking health professionals and community members; and
- The **Community Health and Social Services Network (CHSSN)**, with its 23 networks and 10 satellite networks across Quebec for English-speaking minority communities.

- Assign the team member and inform by completing a tool tracking the Health Canada's responsibility under the OLA.

Part VII of the Official Languages Act (OLA) requires that the federal government is committed to enhancing the vitality of the English and French minority communities in Canada and supporting their development, as well as to promoting the full recognition and use of both English and French in Canadian society.

An Impact Analysis, implementing Part VII involves, on one hand, improving access to health services in official language minority communities (OLMCs) and, on the other hand, including OLMCs in all national initiatives, where relevant.

Three principles guide the activities related to improving access to health services in OLMCs: equity, quality of services and patient safety in the patient's preferred language.

The purpose of this tool is to make it possible to meet the requirements of Part VII of the Official Languages Act (OLA) and to support employees in completing the impact analysis needed when developing a Memorandum to Cabinet or a Treasury Board Submission in order to obtain an appropriation.

Once completed, this tool will be submitted to the Official Language Community Development Bureau (OLCDB), which will proceed with the evaluation.

FEDERAL HEALTH PORTFOLIO CONSULTATIVE COMMITTEE FOR OFFICIAL LANGUAGE MINORITY COMMUNITIES IN CANADA: TERMS OF REFERENCE

INTRODUCTION

Section 41 of the Official Languages Act commits the federal government to promote the vitality of Canada's French and English linguistic minorities and to promote the full recognition and use of French and English in Canadian society. Under this section, it is the responsibility of federal institutions to ensure that positive measures are taken to implement this commitment.

Members of the Health Portfolio, including Health Canada, the Canadian Institutes of Health Research and the Public Health Agency of Canada, commit to consider the impact of their activities on official language minorities during the planning, development, implementation, and accountability stages. To facilitate the integration of the needs of these minorities, the Portfolio members agreed to create the Federal Health Portfolio Consultative Committee for Official Language Minority Communities in Canada (FHPCC-OLMC).

RESPONSIBILITIES

The FHPCC-OLMC (the committee) reports to the Health Portfolio and plays a supporting role to the senior management of each member organization in the development of policies and programs that take into account Canada's Francophone and Anglophone minorities. The mandate of this consultative committee includes:

- Addressing the health needs of official language minority communities;
- Consulting with communities about health portfolio policies and priorities that directly affect OLMCs;
- Encouraging discussion and exchange of knowledge, tools and best practices for the promotion of official languages;
- Fostering networking, collaboration and coordination between government and community partners; and
- Reporting back to the deputy heads of the Health Portfolio on the committee's discussions and the resulting outcomes and recommendations through an annual report.

The deputy heads are the Deputy Minister of Health Canada, the President of the Canadian Institutes of Health Research, and the President of the Public Health Agency of Canada.

WORKING GROUP ON DATA AND RESEARCH ON OFFICIAL LANGUAGE MINORITY COMMUNITIES AND HEALTH, 2020-2023

Mandate

The Working Group on Data and Research on Official Language Minority Communities (OLMCs) and Health (WG) reports to the Federal Health Portfolio Consultative Committee for Official Language Minority Communities in Canada (Advisory Committee).

The WG aims to better understand and coordinate the research and data collection efforts of its members regarding OLMCs and health, to support the Advisory Committee and to inform future decisions on research and data.

The WG focuses on issues related to access to health services in English and French – depending on the user's choice – and on the quality and safety of health care (from prevention to treatment) offered in a context of linguistic discrepancy between patient and caregiver. The activities of the WG are aligned with the priorities of the Federal Health Portfolio.

A detailed work plan presents the activities planned for the WG on an annual basis. The plan must be approved by the Advisory Committee. The activities' status will be presented to the Advisory Committee, and adjustments could be made, as needed. The first mandate of the WG will be for 2020 to 2023 and could be renewed if necessary, after evaluation by the Advisory Committee.

Chair

The WG is co-chaired by a representative from the Health Portfolio and a community representative. The co-chairs' mandate is for one year, with the possibility of renewal.

Secretariat functions

The secretariat functions are provided by the Health Canada's Official Language Community Development Bureau (OLCDB).

Members

The WG membership comprises representatives from the targeted beneficiary organizations of the Official Languages Health Program (Community Health and Social Services Network, Société santé en français; Université McGill; Association des collèges et universités de la francophonie canadienne – Consortium national de formation en santé), the Canadian Institute for Research on Linguistic Minorities, the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council, and the federal government organizations that are part of the Advisory Committee.

Other government institutions, community and academia stakeholders may be invited to join as members, as guests or observers, or as presenters to discuss issues of interest related to the mandate.
