

ATIA Review

- In 2016, Government committed to review the *Access to Information Act* in two phases
 - ➤ Phase I: Bill C-58 targeted amendments came into force June 2019
 - > Phase II: full review of the Act
- Bill C-58 created legislative obligations for President of Treasury Board
 - > Review the Act every 5 years, with first review starting by June 21, 2020
 - Table a report of the review in Parliament
- Senate and House standing committees also required to undertake reviews of the Act every 5 years

Review

- Review was launched on June 18, 2020
 - Website
 - News release
- Website includes:
 - Preliminary details about the review process
 - > Background information on access to information in the federal government
 - > Data on the impacts of COVID-19 on access to information
- Website also invites Canadians to subscribe to updates





Two-stage approach to seeking input from government institutions

Stage 1 – Issue identification (November – December 2020)

- Call out to Deputies seeking input on key issues to be addressed November 2020
 - ➤ A single ADM-approved response per institution due in December 2020

Stage 2 – Detailed input (January 2021 – February 2021)

- Call out for more detailed input from institutions on identified issues, with responses due in February
- Summary of input will be published on the Review webpage
- Review Secretariat may reach out to institutions for additional information or discussion of specific issues beginning in mid-2021
