



- 2,683 Indigenous people were enslaved
- Similarly to Africans, bought and sold for domestic and manual labour
- Estimated 57% of these people were young women and girls



3 PILLARS OF THE DECADE FOR PEOPLE

OF AFRICAN DESCENT 2014-2024

- 1. **RECOGNITION**: acknowledge the multi-generational harms caused by enslavement.
- 2. **JUSTICE**: Government of Canada to take accountability for Canada's roots in Anti-Black Racism to bring justice to our ancestors.
- 3. **DEVELOPMENT**: creating a space for healing: a necessary element for development.





EMANCIPATION DAY AUGUST 1st

- In Canada, Africans were trafficked for domestic and manual labour
- August 1, 1834
- Slavery Abolition Act came into effect
- Slavery was abolished in Canada and across the British Empire



IMPORTANCE OF EMANCIPATION DAY


Exposing the myth that Canada was exclusively the 'Promised Land' Recognizing the existence of slavery in Canada
