IMPACT ANALYSIS TOOL

PART VII OF THE OFFICIAL LANGUAGES ACT

Objective:

The objective of this tool is to support Health Canada (HC) employees in completing the impact analysis of a new or existing initiative to ensure its compliance with Part VII of the Official Languages Act (OLA).

This analysis is <u>mandatory for all Health Canada initiatives and must be approved at the</u> Director General level.

- For budget proposals, memoranda to Cabinet and for Treasury Board submissions, the impact analysis must be provided to the Official Language Community Development Bureau (OLCDB - hc.olcdb-baclo.sc@canada.ca) for validation and to obtain the required attestation.
- For other initiatives, completing this impact analysis tool documents the analysis that
 was conducted leading to the development of an initiative and/or a decision and
 could help demonstrate that requirements under Part VII of the OLA were met in the
 event of a legal challenge.

Context:

Under Part VII of the modernized OLA, the Government of Canada is committed to enhancing the vitality of official language minority communities (OLMCs - French-speaking people outside Quebec or English-speaking people in Quebec), and to promoting the full recognition and use of English and French in Canadian society.

The government is also committed to protecting and promoting the French language, in addition to advancing learning opportunities for OLMC members that are in their own language, throughout their lives.

Federal institutions, including Health Canada, are required to take positives measures to implement these commitments.

As such, Initiative leads are required to:

- Understand the priorities of OLMCs and other relevant OL stakeholders (gathered through, to the extent possible, dialogue and consultation activities, data collection and/or research, and evidence-based findings);
- **Consider** whether positive measures could be taken to implement the commitments discussed above;
- Alter, as appropriate, any positive measures planned in order to incorporate the views of OLMC;

- Consider the possibilities for avoiding, or at least mitigating, the direct negative impacts that proposed structuring decisions (see next section for examples) may have on OLA Part VII commitments;
- Take the necessary measures to promote the inclusion of appropriately tailored
 official languages clauses in agreements with provincial and territorial governments;
- Implement any measures that have been decided upon to support the government's commitments mentioned above (these measures <u>must be concrete and planned</u>), or to avoid or mitigate negative impacts;
- Systematically monitor and evaluate progress towards achieving expected results
 - Use the Health Canada Monitoring and Self-Assessment Tool of Positive Measures under Part VII of the Official Languages Act to help you track the effectiveness of your positive measures.

For more detailed information on Part VII obligations, please consult the Health Canada Policy on the Implementation of Part VII of the Official Languages Act and Part VII of the OLA.

Note: Other obligations under the OLA could apply to your initiative:

- E.g. Part IV obligations (communications and services to the public) may apply if a third-party organization or individual acts on behalf of the government of Canada.

Additional considerations:

- On positive measures: Translating documents, communicating with the public in both official languages or targeting "the Canadian population in general, including OLMCs" are generally not sufficient to meet Part VII of the OLA's positive measure requirements. Examples of positive measures could include, but are not limited to:
 - o the development of virtual health services in the minority official language;
 - outreach to OLMCs in their preferred official language in information/communication campaigns to improve/protect their health; and,
 - o support for research projects in French.
- On grants and contributions: The assessment of <u>project proposals</u> under a grant or contribution program must also consider the impact of proposed projects on Part VII commitments. To do so, the assessment form must include mandatory criteria on Part VII of the OLA.
 - OLA obligations apply directly to federal institutions (including Health Canada), not to funding recipients, including provinces or territories, third-party organizations or individuals.
 - Health Canada will be held responsible for the inclusion (or not) of measures in support of Part VII of the OLA in funded projects and the implementation and monitoring of any such measures.

- On interdepartmental initiatives: Part VII obligations likely apply to all federal institutions participating in a collaborative initiative, and each institution must therefore engage in the required analysis.
 - A collaborative approach may be acceptable but consultation with Legal Services is recommended to determine whether a proposed joint analytical approach could satisfy OLA Part VII obligations.
- On agreements with provincial and territorial governments: The obligation to
 promote the inclusion of official languages clauses in agreements with provincial and
 territorial governments must be documented in addition to other Part VII obligations
 related to the adoption of positive measures and avoiding/mitigating direct negative
 impacts.
- On structuring decisions: These decisions could include, for example:
 - The creation or termination of a program or policy;
 - The restructuring of a program's priorities or strategic objectives;
 - o Substantial modification of the terms and conditions of a program;
 - Decisions about budget cuts; and
 - Decisions which require approval through a Memorandum to Cabinet or Treasury Board submission.
- On potential challenges: Information provided to the Commissioner of Official Languages or other parties must be reviewed carefully to avoid any unauthorised disclosure of Cabinet confidences.
 - o Consultation with Legal Services is recommended.
